Carthage, Kennard Elementary School Properties Garner Just Seven Bids at Recent Real Estate Auction


As of last Thursday's submission deadline, the Charles A. Beard Memorial School Board had received seven bids for all or a portion of the former elementary school properties in Carthage and Kennard.

The CAB School Board was expected to consider and possibly take action on the bids at last night's monthly board meeting, which was held after the news deadline for this week's issue of The Banner.

Earlier this year, CAB had two appraisals done of both properties. The appraisals for the former Carthage school and real estate on which it sits at 511 E. 2nd St. came in at \$205,300 and \$172,000, while the appraisals for the Kennard building and land at 232 Vine St. were for \$198,600 and \$195,000.

CAB's initial efforts to sell the properties for at least 90-percent of the average of the two appraisals, as required by state statute - \$169,785 for Carthage and \$177,120 for Kennard - were not successful. That first 60-day window for acceptance of bids closed May 26 with no offers received.

In June, school board members voted to hire Harmeyer Auction & Appraisal Co. to conduct a sealed bid auction on the properties. Harmeyer, which handled a successful auction of surplus items for CAB back in February, will be paid a commission of 8 percent from any sale proceeds.



According to information included in the packet of materials provided to board members in advance of last night's meeting and given to The Banner Monday afternoon, six of the seven bids CAB has received were for the Kennard property.

A company called Pegasus Development LLC offered \$50,000 for the former Kennard school building and the approximately 13

acres on which it sits. That is only 28.2 percent of the average of the two appraisals CAB previously obtained for this property.

Three of the other Kennard bids were for a portion of the property consisting of approximately 6.7 acres of tillable land. The amounts of those bids were \$35,555 (J. and J. Linder), \$23,450 (K. and L. Freeman) and \$17,950 (P. and J. Penticuff).

The final two Kennard bids were for a third tract, the property's front lot, which consists of about 1.6 acres. Those bids were \$5,260 (P. and J. Penticuff) and \$5,001 (town of Kennard).

The only bid received for the Carthage property, which consists of the building and approximately 9.8 acres of land, was offered by Carthage Community Church. The amount of that bid was \$14,000, only 8.2 percent of the average of the two appraisals CAB received earlier this year.

More information about these bids and the last night's CAB School Board meeting will be featured in next week's issue of The Banner.

K-town Budget Hearing Tomorrow Night

The Knightstown Town Council will hold a public hearing on the town's proposed budget for 2016 Thursday evening.

According to the town's notice to taxpayers (see Page 3 of this week's Banner), the town council will consider a budget for next year that totals \$993,210. That is \$139,580, or 16.4 percent, more than the \$853,630 budget the state approved for the town for 2015.

By fund, the town's proposed 2016 budget breaks down as follows: Rainy Day (\$0); General (\$652,000); Local Roads and Streets (\$55,000); Motor Vehicle Highway (\$64,167); Park (\$70,000); Cemetery (\$80,000); Cumulative Capital Improvement (\$11,443); Cumulative Capital

Development (\$20,600); Law Enforcement Aid (\$10,000); Local Law Enforcement Continuing Education (\$10,000); and Riverboat (\$20,000).

Last year, Knightstown advertised a proposed budget for 2015 that totaled \$981,770. The final budget amount approved by the state, \$853,630, was 13 percent less.

Tomorrow night's public hearing will be held at 7 p.m. in the council's chambers, located at 28 S. Washington St. The council's regular monthly meeting is scheduled to start at 6 p.m., an hour earlier than usual, as council members continue reviewing the town's personnel policies.

Members of the public will

have the opportunity at tomorrow's hearing to ask questions and offer comments on the proposed budget, tax rate and tax levy required to fund it. Within seven days after the hearing, any 10 or more taxpayers can file a petition with the town objecting to any part of the proposed budget, tax rate or tax levy.

The Knightstown Town Council is expected to vote on adoption of the town's 2016 budget at its Oct. 15 monthly meeting. That meeting will also be held at 7 p.m. in the council's chambers.

As the result of a change in state law that took effect this year, many Hoosiers will likely have a harder time accessing information about the proposed 2016 budgets and tax levies for school districts, libraries,

towns, cities, townships and counties.

Prior to this year, citizens who wanted to know how much these units of government planned to spend and tax for the coming year simply needed to look in their local newspapers. Legal notices advising taxpayers of proposed budgets and tax levies for the coming year, and advising them of public hearings and meetings where budget adoption votes would be taken, were required to be published twice.

As a result of Gov. Mike Pence's signing of House Enrolled Act 1266 into law in March 2014, however, that has changed. Beginning this year, political units

Local Election Board Meeting Next Week

The Knightstown Election Board will hold its second meeting next week as its three members continue making preparations for the town's Nov. 3 town election.

The meeting will be held at 2 p.m. next Wednesday, Sept. 23, in the Knightstown Town Council's chambers at 28 S. Washington St. The meeting is open to the public.

At their first meeting, held Aug. 26, the election board's three members - Knightstown Clerk-Treasurer Bart Whitesitt, Cassandra Steele and Betsy Wilkerson - voted to have the polls open 6 a.m.-6 p.m. at Knightstown Town Hall on Election Day. The board also approved the following pay schedule for poll workers: clerks (\$125); judges (\$135); and inspectors (\$175).

Board members are expected to discuss setting dates and times for week-end absentee voting at today's meeting and voting for persons unable to make it to the polling location. Another topic likely to be covered is the printing of paper ballots for the election.

Three of the Knightstown Town Council's five seats, those for Wards 1, 3 and 4, are up for election this fall. Only one of those three seats, however, will feature a contested race.

In Ward 1, Democrat Kevin Richey will face Republican Roger

Hammer, while Republican Kevin Knott and Democrat Mitch Roland have no challengers for the Ward 3 and Ward 4 seats, respectively. With Ward 1 council member Clyde South not seeking reelection and Town Council President Cort Swincher getting beat by Knott for the GOP's nomination for the Ward 3 seat, Roland is the only incumbent who will be returning for another term.

In Knightstown, town council candidates may only run for the council seat for the ward in which they live, but town voters are permitted to vote for all town council candidates. Even though Knott and Roland will face no challengers on Nov. 3, their names will still be required to appear on the ballot.

The other race that will be featured in Knightstown this fall is one for the office of clerk-treasurer. Incumbent Bart Whitesitt is not seeking reelection, setting up a contest between two political newcomers, Democrat Ashley Lapham and Republican Beth Ann Huffman.

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Park Board Continuing Its Work Updating Five-year Master Plan

The Knightstown Parks and Recreation Board will meet this evening and continue its work updating the board's five-year master plan.

Board members held a special meeting in late July to begin reviewing the five-year plan and considering revisions to it. They came up with a list of about a dozen things they would like to accomplish, including renovating the park shelter house, replacing or repairing the bridge at Sunset Park and figuring out a way to finance construction of a swimming pool.

"It just needs a little TLC," board member Kevin Richey said of the shelter house. He said he didn't think it would take much money to improve the facility's interior, and said the park board has funding to do some of the needed work now.

One possible improvement to the outside of the shelter house that was discussed is construction of a deck on the west side of the building. Richey suggested the board work on developing a plan in 2016 for that project, and board member Suzee Neal said the board could try to have funding for this set by 2017, with construction to happen in 2018.

As for a new swimming pool at the park, Neal said the board should consider seeking estimates on this

work next year, with a goal of having a plan for financing in place by 2018 and installation of the pool completed by 2020.

"That'll be here before we know it," Neal said.

Board President Belinda Grigsby said she thinks the park board needs to work on getting the bridge at the park repaired or replaced. She also said she would like to see some of the older playground equipment repainted and some new equipment purchased.

Other projects that were discussed included: developing a canoe/kayak launch at town-owned property off South Washington Street; extending the park board's jurisdiction to include all of Wayne Township; developing more activities at the park; cleaning up around the lake; and creating a workout area for adults.

Grigsby told The Banner that she and other park board members would like to have input from the public about what they would like the park board to accomplish over the next five years. Tonight's meeting, which is open to the public, starts at 7 p.m. and will be held in the back meeting room at Knightstown Town Hall, 26 S. Washington St.

Instead, this information is only required to be submitted online to the Indiana Department of Local Government Finance's Gateway website, where it will be available to those with Internet access.

Fortunately for readers of The Banner, not all political units have

4. Have lived in the precinct where he or she will vote for at least 30 days prior to the election; and

5. Be registered to vote.

Like me, kids won't ever believe how fast time flies once adulthood arrives. It's impossible for them to conceive, of course, that time, which crawls so slowly in adolescence, could somehow accelerate to seeming light speed.

In youth, time feebly lurches. We long for the "freedom" of adult life. Our parents' restrictions on our youthful liberties are nearly intolerable, and in our foolish naivete, we believe our virtually obligation-free existence as teenagers is somehow worse than modern entrapments like home mortgages, credit card debt and myriad other adult responsibilities.

So oppressed are we as youths, that we often don't

consider - for even a second - that we might not know what we're talking about, or that our more experienced parents possess even a shred of credible knowledge about how the world works.

Boy, did I get that one wrong ... like so many others, I am sure.

Yet, for all of our experience in not knowing what we're talking about, why is it so difficult to convince our own kids that our life experience is substantial and there is much then can learn from our very own mistakes? Why, after all our own coming-of-age realizations, is it so hard to make that point to our own progeny?

It is truly a mystery of life, and a conundrum of adolescent youth. Of course, not all kids are this way. Some actually listen to their parents. But, I think it's a hallmark of teenage insanity to scoff at experience and fully embrace The Dumb.

I did it. You may have done it. We survived, like we knew we would. The question that irks me still is this: how did our parents survive? How did they go on with life after so many of our smart-ass shrugs and smug indifference when they warned us or told us "how it used to be."

Our proverbial hindsight is 20/20, they say. That means looking back, we see things as they truly were, instead of how we thought they should be at the time.

Maybe that's how we should explain our own experience to our kids. Instead of telling them how fast time flies, we should explain our perspectives before and after we reached adulthood.

After all, it may not be possible to understand the perceived increase in speed of time's passage upon becoming responsible adults. Only experience in life itself can illustrate that crucial fact.

Dear Editor,

For Chris Madden, the idea of a career in the trades began in high school at a career and technical education center. He enjoyed the hands-on work of building a house and was intrigued by the electrical work. Some of Madden's friends already were pursuing electrical apprenticeships and told Madden how to follow in their footsteps.

That interest and information provided inspiration and a pathway to Madden's future. Still a question lingered. What about college? The Institute for College Access and Success found that in 2013 the average student debt in Indiana was \$28,466. And while a college degree typically results in greater lifetime earnings, some college grads find landing their first job difficult.

"It's kind of hard to (go to college) and not be promised a job right out of school if you go four years," Madden said. "(The apprenticeship) was very attractive to me to be able to know that I would be guaranteed work for the next five years."

Employers across Indiana need more Chris Maddens now and in the future. The Indiana Chamber of Commerce's 2015 Employer Survey found that 75 percent of the respondents' workforce is estimated to be eligible for retirement within the next five years.

Employers say retiring Baby Boomers and expected job growth will create available occupations with a range of education and skill levels, from high school graduates to doctoral degrees. But 39 percent of the jobs listed in the survey require either a workforce credential or an associate degree, both of which can be earned in two years or less.

Subaru of Indiana Automotive operates an 18-month internship program that allows trainees to earn \$30,000 while obtaining a workforce credential or associate degree from Vincennes University. Madden's five-year apprenticeship through the Electrical Training Institute included a \$40,000 per year salary while earning an associate degree in applied sciences from Ivy Tech.

Ivy Tech offers programs statewide to train students for the skilled trades or technician level jobs but, according to the community college's vice president for Technology Division, doesn't have enough students in the pipeline to meet employers' demand.

That's why organizations such as the Electrical Training Institute, the Indiana Plan, the Indiana Construction Roundtable and Indiana's Regional Works Councils—local partnerships between business, education, and manufacturing—are trying to increase awareness about the opportunities that are available in the skilled trades, advanced manufacturing and related fields.

More than 100 years after the first Labor Day celebration, Indiana employers hope a new movement of highly trained, skilled workers will keep the state's economy humming along. And for a generation facing the highest college costs ever, middle-skill job training may offer an attractive path to a sustainable future.

True or false: Until your vehicle is out-of-warranty, it must be serviced by the new car dealer or the factory warranty will be void? Although you may have answered "true," the correct answer is "false."

It's the law that consumers can have routine repairs performed by their local independent repair shop or do the work themselves without affecting the warranty. The Magnuson-Moss Warranty Act, enforced by the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), prohibits a manufacturer from voiding the vehicle warranty because service was done by a non-dealer.

According to the FTC, "It's illegal for a dealer to deny your warranty coverage simply because you had routine maintenance or repairs performed

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Poultry Ban Being Lifted Tomorrow

Indiana poultry can resume regular movements to shows and sales beginning Sept. 17. Beginning on that date, poultry movements that include a change in ownership must be documented to allow easier disease traces.

Movement of poultry that allowed birds from different locations to commingle was banned earlier this year to protect Indiana's poultry from potential spread of the H5 avian influenza virus. That meant many county fairs offered alternative activities to poultry shows.

"We appreciate the cooperation from bird owners and exhibitors during the past few months," said Dr. Bret D. Marsh, Indiana state veterinarian. "The sacrifices made during this unprecedented disease event have not gone unnoticed. The Board of Animal Health continues to be committed to protecting the health of the birds in the state."

Sept. 17 marks 90 days since the last case of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) was identified in the United States. The members of the Indiana State Board of Animal Health (BOAH) voted to lift the ban to allow normal movements to resume with the additional recordkeeping to provide a way to trace any dis-

ease breaks, should HPAI return to Indiana.

Beginning Sept. 17, bird owners are required to maintain records of sales and purchases (including trades/barters) to their flocks. This requirement brings poultry permanently under Indiana's Animal Disease Traceability (ADT) rule.

The records need to be retained by the flock owner for three years and must include: names and addresses of buyer and seller, sale date, breed, sex, number of animals and reason for movement. Poultry species do not have to be individually identified. But, if the birds do have identification such as a band, the identification needs to be noted in the poultry movement records. BOAH veterinarians may request the records in a disease investigation. These records must be kept, not provided to BOAH unless needed.

Cambridge City Couple Wins Indiana Landmarks Award

Indiana Landmarks presented its annual Servaas Memorial Awards for outstanding achievement in historic preservation on Sept. 12 in Indianapolis. Winners included a couple from Cambridge City and a nonprofit preservation organization in Union City.

Indiana Landmarks Honorary Chairman Randall Shepard, former Indiana Supreme Court chief justice, presented the awards at Indiana Landmarks' 55th annual meeting in Indianapolis. Each winner received an original Servaas Memorial Award sculpture, "No Doors to Lock out the Past," by Evansville artist John McNaughton. James and Norma Bertsch of Cambridge City, winners in the individual category, took home \$1,000. The Preservation Society of Union City IN-OH won \$2,000 in the nonprofit category.

Like Dorothy in the Wizard of Oz, James and Norma Bertsch believe there's no place like home, and they want to make it better. They moved away from Cambridge City for Jim's medical school education. He was working as a physician in Ohio when they learned in 1977 that both doctors in

their hometown were retiring. The Bertsches moved back to Cambridge City almost overnight.

The couple began restoring historic landmarks soon after, starting with their 1850 home. In 1988, they turned an 1848 building into Dr. Bertsch's medical office. "When the hardware store on the National Road was going out of business, we worried that the building could go the wrong way, so we bought and restored it," Dr. Bertsch recalls. Then they bought and restored two more sections of the old opera house, and in 2013 the section in between. They operate it as a vast emporium—antiques, and home and garden décor.

"Their restoration of the block made a visible difference and set a standard that others have followed in fixing up historic buildings and revitalizing Cambridge City," noted Shepard, chairman of the award committee.

An older friend who lived in the historic Solomon Meredith House asked them to take care of his house after he died, so they bought and restored it, too. "We host meetings there while they search for a buyer who'll do the right thing for

the property," says Norma Bertsch. The couple is also active in Western Wayne Heritage, the community's nonprofit preservation group.

Ron Morris, a Ball State professor, nominated the Bertsches for the Servaas Memorial Award, citing their National Road restoration projects for sparking other renovations and attracting new businesses to the downtown, a major destination along eastern Indiana's Antique Alley.

In the nonprofit category, the Servaas Memorial Award went to the Preservation Society of Union City IN-OH, a nonprofit group whose town straddles the state line.

"The organization has a unique approach to real estate projects. Instead of buying endangered buildings, it leases a dilapidated structure with an option to buy it for the pre-restoration price. The members fix it up, using a combination of sweat equity and hired expertise," Shepard notes.

The Preservation Society of Union City rescued the Kirshbaum building in 1987 when it was threatened with demolition. The group operates an antique mall in the restored building. The society

saved another historic building that filled a critical role in the downtown streetscape. The city planned to demolish the structure until the preservation society tackled it, fixing it up in phases and installing a museum, community room and gallery.

"In the end, the city bought back the renovated building from the preservation society to use as city hall and gave the museum

and community room sections back to the group. The Preservation Society invested the money from the sale in a preservation fund at the Randolph County Community Foundation. From Indiana Landmarks' perspective, that's triple win," Shepard declared.

The Preservation Society's most recent lease-and-restore project is a **See Cambridge, Page 8**

4. Any National Voter Registration Act full service agency (e.g., Workforce Development offices or Family and Social Services Administration offices); or
5. Local public libraries that have voter registration applications available.

Once a voter registration application is received, the county voter registration office will process the application and determine the

voter's eligibility. If determined to be eligible, the county office will send the voter a voter registration acknowledgment card. Once that card is received, the voter will be officially registered. If not eligible, or if the application was incomplete, the applicant will receive a notice denying the application or requesting the missing information.

If a voter registration card or a notice from the county voter registration office is not received within about 30 days, the county voter registration office should be contacted. Voter registration status and polling location information can also be accessed online anytime at www.indianavoters.com or by call-

ing 1-866-IN-1-VOTE. How do I vote by absentee ballot?

To vote absentee by mail, voters must complete the Application for Absentee Ballot (ABS-Mail) form and mail it to your local county election office or, in the case of a town running its own election, like Knightstown, the town election office. Voters can cast absentee ballots in person beginning 28 days before Election Day at locations designated by the county or local election board. commercial building at 207 E. Elm Street, which it hopes to sell for a coffee shop or wine bar. In the meantime, it leases refurbished space to an art gallery and hosts community events in the building.

Spiceland Still Moving Forward on Annexation

The Spiceland Town Council recently passed a resolution and introduced an ordinance, that once adopted, will approve the voluntary annexation of 13.5 acres on the west end of town.

The council's five members voted unanimously at their Sept. 1 monthly meeting to pass a resolution adopting a fiscal plan for the annexation of the land, which includes seven residential homes and six undeveloped lots located off Woods Edge Drive and West Main Street. They also introduced an ordinance approving the annexation, with a final vote of adoption expected to come at a special council meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 29, at 6 p.m.

In other business, the council held a public hearing on the town's proposed \$241,100 budget for 2016. By fund, the budget breaks down as follows: General (\$137,400); Local Roads and Streets (\$22,500); Motor Vehicle Highway (\$54,000); and Cemetery (\$26,200). The council is scheduled

to vote on adoption of the budget at the Oct. 6 monthly meeting.

Dave Kieser of Kieser Consulting Group LLC gave a brief presentation to the council on the possible formation of a fire protection territory that would consolidate volunteer fire departments in Spiceland, Dunreith and Lewisville. He handed out copies of a planning study to the council and said he would go over it in detail in October.

"We're not quite there yet," Kieser said of efforts to form the territory, "but we will be in a couple of months." He said that

between January and April, he expects to be ready to ask the council to approve an ordinance approving formation of the territory.

According to Kieser, consolidation of the smaller fire departments into one fire protection territory could lower insurance costs and bring savings on equipment purchases and fuel expenses. He also said it may make it easier to obtain grants.

"We want everyone to be buying into this thing," Kieser said. "That's the only way it's going to work."

Compensation Levels for Local Government Workers Posted

As a service to our readers, The Banner plans to periodically publish compensation information for employees of local units of government at the county, township and municipal levels, as well as area school corporations. The information will be obtained from the Certified Reports of Names, Addresses, Duties and Compensation of Public Employees (Form 100R) required by law to be filed with the Indiana State Board of Accounts by Jan. 31 each year, which show the compensation of the governmental units' employees for the preceding calendar year.

*The Form 100R reports the towns of Spiceland and Kennard filed with the Indiana State Board of Accounts for compensation paid to town employees and officials during calendar year 2014 did not identify the specific departments in which the employees and officials worked, as required by state statute. As noted in previous issues of The Banner, the SBA has taken the position that this information, which is required by state statute to be included in the Form 100R reports, should be included in future reports.

asked Trimmell to call the public hearing to order. With no citizens present, the hearing was concluded in less than three minutes.

According to the township's notice to taxpayers, which can be accessed online through the state's Gateway website at www.budgetnotices.in.gov, Wayne Township is considering a budget totaling \$323,976 for 2016. Individual budget amounts for the township's five funds are as follows: General (\$41,900); Township Assistance (\$57,600); Fire (\$175,000); Emergency Fire Loan (\$24,476); and Recreation (\$25,000).

On Monday, The Banner spoke to Dan Jones, the assistant director of the state's Department of Local Government Finance's budget division, about the township board's failure to have a quorum present for last week's hearing. Jones said Wayne Township is not the only township that found itself in this situation and that the DLGF, which is in charge of approving budgets for local units of government, is still trying to figure out how to respond.

Without a quorum present, Jones said it is questionable as to whether the township board could even convene and conduct its budget hearing. Should his agency determine that at least two members need to be in attendance, he said Wayne Township and others similarly situated may find that their proposed budgets for 2016 being rejected, leaving them to work with the same budgets they had for 2015.

Public Absent at Budget Hearing

Last week's public hearing on Wayne Township's proposed budget for 2016 was very brief and not well attended by citizens or even members of the Wayne Township Board.

Ronald Trimmell, chairman of the Wayne Township Board, was the only board member who attended the budget hearing, scheduled for 7 p.m. last Thursday. Wayne Township Trustee Randy Overman was also in attendance.

Overman texted a second board member, Jeff Van Hoy, at a little after seven. Van Hoy texted Overman back and said he was working and was not going to be able to make it.

The township board's third member, Larry White, was also not in attendance. White, one of two township board incumbents who did not seek reelection last fall, had just been appointed by the Henry County Commissioners the night before to be a hold-over township board member until a replacement is selected.

Despite not having a quorum of the township board present, Overman

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
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
