Carthage School Sold for \$14,000; Kennard \$50,000

The Charles A. Beard School Board has approved the sale of the former Kennard and Carthage elementary school properties.

School board members voted at their Sept. 15 monthly meeting to sell the Kennard property for \$50,000 and the Carthage property for \$14,000, far below their appraised values.

Earlier this year, CAB had two appraisals done of both properties. The appraisals for the former Carthage school and real estate on which it sits at 511 E. 2nd St. came in at \$205,300 and \$172,000, while the appraisals for the Kennard building and land at 232 Vine St. were for \$198,600 and \$195,000.

CAB's initial efforts to sell the properties for at least 90-percent of the average of the two appraisals, as required by state statute - \$169,785 for Carthage and \$177,120 for Kennard - were not successful. That first 60-day window for acceptance of bids closed May 26 with no offers received.

In June, school board members voted to hire Harmeyer Auction & Appraisal Co. to conduct a sealed bid auction on the properties. Harmeyer, which handled a successful auction of surplus items for CAB back in February, will be paid a commission of 8 percent from any sale proceeds.

As reported in last week's Banner, CAB received six bids on the Kennard property. School board members voted 6-0 to accept the \$50,000 bid submitted by Pegasus Development LLC, which was the highest bid and the only one that was for the building and the approximately 13 acres on which it

Greensboro Township resident George King, a representative of Pegasus, told the board that the company plans to convert the former school into a "very nice" senior living complex.

"We've done a lot of research on it and we think we can make this a very nice addition to the town of Kennard," King said. "... It's the kind of place I'd want my parents to be. ... We want to do a real class act with it."

King clarified that this will not be an assisted living facility. That, he said, would require the

KHS Graduate, Former CAB Superintendent Bob Myers Dies After Lifetime of Civic Duty

Robert L. "Bob" Myers December 9, 1931 - September 19, 2015

Robert L. "Bob" Myers, 83, educator and civic leader, passed away Saturday, Sept. 19, 2015, at Hancock Regional Hospital in Greenfield.

He was born on Dec. 9, 1931, to the late William Arvil and Rovena (Somers) Myers in Jonesboro, N.C. The family moved to the Knightstown area in 1936 and Bob attended school in Mays. He later transferred to Knightstown High School, where he graduated in 1949.

Bob was a 1953 graduate of Hanover College and was a member of Beta Theta Pi fraternity. There he met the love of his life, Carolyn Scholer, and they married on Christmas Eve in 1953, before Bob entered the U.S. Army. They spent the first two years of their nearly 62 years of marriage at Fort Lewis, Wash., where Bob served in the 33rd Artillery Division.

After completing his active duty service, Bob returned to Knightstown in 1955. He was hired to teach social studies at Knightstown High School. He graduated from Butler University in 1958 with a master's degree in public education and school finance. Bob became guidance counselor in 1958, then served as principal from 1959-1966 and superintendent of the Charles A. Beard Memorial School School Corp. from 1966-1974. As an educator, he inspired many students. He was the first graduate of Knightstown High School to become superintendent. Bob's tenure was marked by the successful consolidation of Greensboro and Kennard Schools and the annexation of Ripley Township schools. Bob also served on the board of directors of the Indiana High School Athletic Association.

In 1974 Bob became president of Citizens National Bank, a career he pursued for 15 years, which included three bank mergers. Bob was appointed a financial aid officer at Ball State University in 1988 and served as guidance counselor at Shenandoah High School from 1990-1996.

Bob provided service and leadership to many community groups, including the Knightstown Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis Club, Knightstown Public Library and Historic Knightstown Inc. He held board positions at Historic Knightstown, Inc. and spearheaded the group's digital archiving effort, which preserved the museum's large historic photo collection in a digital format. This was no small undertaking, and it represents a major step in HKI's development as a serious historical preservation society.

Bob's Christian faith was evident throughout his life, by his baptism at Center Christian Church, and his membership at Bethel Presbyterian Church, Westminster Presbyterian Church and in Bible Study Fellowship. With friend Tom O'Dell he mentored a father/son Christ-centered fishing trip to "Camp Swampy," where he became known as "Uncle Bob."

Bob will be deeply missed by his wife, Carolyn; their children and families, Elizabeth "Libby" Prather and husband Trent of Bedford, Texas, Margaret "Molly" Ballard of Evansville, Robert L. "Bobby" Myers Jr. and wife Elizabeth of Doylestown, Pa., and John Mansfield Myers of Knightstown; and nine grandchildren, Clark Prather, Bryn Prather, Claire Ballard, Nolan Ballard, Robert Myers III, Ruthanne Myers, Hannah Myers, Naomi Myers and Nathanael Myers.

Family and friends will celebrate a life well-lived by Bob on Monday Sept. 28, at 11 a.m. at Heritage Funeral Care in Knightstown, with an hour of calling prior to service. Friends may also visit on Sunday, Sept. 27, from 2-6 p.m. at the funeral home, with Masonic Services starting at 6 p.m. Burial will be in Glen Cove Cemetery in Knightstown with full military honors. His son, Robert L. Myers, will be presiding. In memory of Bob, memorial contributions may be made to a charity of choice or Bible Study Fellowship Memorial Fund, BFS International 19001 Huebner Rd. San Antonio, TX 78258. Heritage Funeral Care is honorably serving the Myers family.

Park Board President Resigns

For the second time this year, the president of the Knightstown Parks and Recreation Board has resigned.

Belinda Grigsby told the Knightstown Town Council last Thursday, at that body's Sept. 17 monthly meeting, that she wanted to resign her position on the park board. After a brief discussion, during which Grigsby declined a request to reconsider, council members voted 5-0 to accept her resignation.

Grigsby said at last week's meeting that she had been verbally abused by another member of the board, whom she did not name. She also said attendance had been a problem for some members, noting that a meeting scheduled for the previous night had to be canceled when three of the park board's five members were unable to make it.

Grigsby also criticized some of the town council's members. She said she had left three messages for Council President Cort Swincher, but never heard back from him, and that another, Clyde South, simply told her that you can't always get along with everybody on a board

Council Vice President Sarah Ward asked Grigsby if she would reconsider. Grigsby replied that she

would only reconsider if the board member with whom she was having problems were removed.

Gregg Morelock, the town's attorney, told the council he wasn't sure under what circumstances, if any, that the council, which appoints members of the park board, can remove them from office. Council member Valerie Trump asked whether Grigsby's resignation should wait until Morelock researched that issue.

"Then she needs to retract her resignation," Swincher said.

"We can't make that deal," South said. Grigsby he said, can't condition her resignation on whether the council removes another member. He said if she has problems with other park board members, including verbal abuse, she needs to address that herself. "... I can't deal with that for you."

Swincher made a motion to accept Grigsby's resignation and South seconded it. With support from Trump, Ward and council member Mitch Roland, it passed unanimously.

Grigsby was appointed to the park board earlier this year. In June, after going several months without a president following Randy Riggs' resignation from the park board, Grigsby was chosen to be the new president

Indiana DOE Unveils New Grant Opportunity for Hoosier Teachers

The Indiana Department of Education announced a new grant opportunity for Hoosier educators Tuesday. The grant will support educators who are working to become National Board Certified Teachers (NBCT). Additionally, the grant will be available to educators who have already earned National Board Certification and serve as mentors to current NBCT candidates.

"Hoosier students deserve to have the best educators in their classrooms no matter where they live in our state," said Glenda Ritz, Indiana's superintendent of public instruction. "National Board Certified Teachers serve as leaders and mentors in schools throughout Indiana. However, cost can be a barrier to receiving this certification. That is why I am excited to announce the National Board Certified Teacher Grant to help support our educators in their pursuit of accomplished teaching."

The National Board Certified Teacher Grant is avail-

able to all active educators who qualify for National Board Certification. Award amounts vary from \$300-\$600 for teachers seeking NBCT certification depending on the number of components taken during the 2016 calendar year. NBCT mentors will receive \$500 for each candidate that they mentor, for up to three mentees.

In addition to this new grant opportunity, Superintendent Ritz recently created the Blue Ribbon Commission on the Recruitment and Retention of Excellent Educators to address Indiana's teacher shortage. The Commission, which met for the first time on Sept. 11, is comprised of educators, key stakeholders and legislators and will develop strategies and suggest legislative action to help recruit and retain excellent educators in Hoosier schools.

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CAB Enrollment Drops by 23 Students

Student enrollment in the Charles A. Beard Memorial School Corp. is down once again, but not quite as much as school officials had initially thought it might be.

Superintendent Jed Behny had told board members at their August meeting that the district could have 30 to 40 fewer students this year. Based on the official student count taken last Friday, however, it appears the decrease was only 23 students from last February's official student count.

According to Behny, CAB's average daily membership (ADM), the official count used to determine how much state funding the district gets for its General Fund, was 1,166. In February, when the last official ADM count was

Prior to last Friday's ADM count, kindergartners were only counted as half students each. Now, Behny explained to the CAB School Board at its Sept. 15 monthly meeting, they are each counted as a whole student.

Behny told The Banner on Monday that had kindergartners been counted as whole students last February, CAB's ADM would have been 1,189. Based on last week's ADM, that would put CAB's loss of enrollment at 23 students since last February.

CAB Treasurer Stephanie Madison told The Banner last month that the district currently receives \$5,793.20 per student from the state for CAB's General Fund. If the student enrollment does end up being down 23 students, that would work out to a loss of \$133,243.60.

While the continued loss of students is not something school officials welcome, things could have been worse. Last September, CAB's enrollment dropped 67 students.

At last week's board meeting, Behny said CAB's three schools had seen a "steady increase" in number of students since the school vear began. If it had been figured that day, he said the ADM would have been 1,164, two less than what it ended up being Friday, the official count day.

"It could be better, it could be worse," Behny told the board.

Behny was asked by a board member about enrollment trends in other area school districts.

"It's hit or miss," Behny answered. "Some are up a few, some are down a few. ... There's not a whole lot of rhyme or reason to it."

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
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

Saturday: We met the twins' train and drove through the town. "Wouldn't you like to see Plymouth Rock again," I asked. They didn't respond. Everyone who has visited the Rock tells everyone else that they must see it.

We drove to White Horse Beach where the gracious owner escorted us through the downstairs of a wonderful house built directly on the sand of the beach, about a hundred feet from the surf. Scientists say that life on Earth started in the sea. All I know is that I feel a sense of homecoming and completion whenever I arrive at the great

Early morning: I always take my first delicious cup of coffee out to the deck while it is still dark ah! I watch and wait. Eventually a flame-red eyebrow appears above the horizon. As it rises, it makes a path to it onto the waves. Majestically, that master painter, the sun, casts constantly changing tints on the clouds floating in an azure sky and on the water: rose, pink, mauve, lavender, gold ... 'Do Not Go Gentle Into That Good Night'

"Though wise men at their end know dark is right, Because their words had forked no lightning they Do not go gentle into that good night.

- Dylan Thomas, "Do Not Go Gentle Into That Good Night"

Like I said last week, it's difficult for younger folks to understand the passage of time while they're still in

their youth. Dylan Thomas knew what was up. Although he wrote that poem just five years before his death, Thomas was only middle-aged when he died. The poem was not written for himself, but

maybe for his dying father. Yet, the poem exhibits his rather stark understanding of not only one's sunset years, but also death and, for many people, a terrible foreboding.

Where some might willingly throw in the proverbial towel and call it quits, Thomas implores us to "rage, rage against the dying of the light." I like that fighting spirit. I like the

notion of fighting against something inevitable, perservering against seemingly insurmountable odds - no matter the outcome because it's the struggle itself that counts.

Nineties metal-core band Rage Against the Machine caught on quick, adapting the poem's unofficial title to fit the band's revolutionary persona. It worked, and they jammed, raging out music and lyrics that beckoned the underdog in us all.

The fabled Gonzo Journalist Hunter Thompson embodied that spirit to very end - almost. The Louisville native ultimately took his own life amid much pain and a bodily deterioration hastened by years of hard partying. Yet, in his younger years,

Thompson fairly grabbed life by throat, throttling it for every single millisecond of adrenaline, excitement and brouhaha he managed to squeeze from it.

Oh, he raged all right.

"So we shall let the reader answer this question for himself:" Thompson wrote, "Who is the happier man, he who has braved the storm of life and lived or he who has stayed securely on shore and merely existed?"

It's true, I don't really live my life like he did. But, that doesn't mean I can't appreciate the bold nature of his existence, or the revolutionary spirit of bands like Rage Against the Machine.

> Staying on shore is boring, for sure. But, navigating the rough seas of life is treacherous. We could get

hurt, maybe even die. Yet, that may be

the essence of it right there. In the film Apocalypse Now, Marlon Brando's character, Walter E. Kurtz, explains a similar (if not a touch crazier) take on this theme. 'Crawling on the edge of a straight razor ... that's my dream ... that's my nightmare. Crawling along the edge of a

straight razor - and surviving ..."

Those who had the misfortune of near-death experiences usually return with a similar story. No, I'm not talking about some light at the end of a tunnel or angels. I'm referring to a phrase repeated by these folks again and again. "I'd had never felt more alive than I did right at that moment."

Perched on the edge of the abyss, it's difficult to say how any of us would react, or what emotions we might detail to others after the fact.

Let's just hope that we don't give in so easily - that we don't fold up and pack it in without a fight.

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Regina Payne Enjoys Helping People Through Lady Payne Tax Prep Service

For over 15 years, Knightstown native Regina Payne has been doing her part to aid fellow citizens with her own tax preparation business, Lady Payne Accounting.

According to Payne, helping people is her primary goal.

"Having our taxes done and keeping our books right is a job that everybody has to have," said Payne. "And, as we went to different preparers and I met other people, the amount of money they had to pay to have this done was just horrid. So I guess I automatically loved the numbers and the rules. That's because there's a lot of tax law that goes with it. I memorize well, and I really loved that part."

Another motivation for Payne's work is her dissatisfaction with the heavy prices that people are required to pay in order to deal with mainstream tax preparers like H&R Block.

"I'm not talking about the Knightstown Block, because they're private and they don't

price like the big Block stores do. The big Block stores are so overpriced to people that I started this, partly because I wanted something to do, and because I wanted to help people," she said.

Payne's experience with numbers, taxes and accounting were the result of growing up on a farm. She learned to budget money for animals, and she learned about small crop farming by keeping a farm ledger book.

As she got older, she became more familiar with taxes and accounting, working on small, plain Jane forms. This developed further in her school work, and persisted after high school and college.

"Then I went back to college, got my associate's, and became Lady Payne," said Payne.

15 years of work has opened her eyes to the many ways in which people handle their money, with the occasional odd case. One such rarity that she looks back on is a woman who had made a million dollars from her gambling habit, only to get a refund.

Laughing, Payne said, "You can see why that one would stand out in your mind!"

She is assisted with Lady Payne Accounting by her daughter, Becca Macy, who works alongside Payne as a tax preparer or Registered Tax Return Preparer (RTRP).

"By the end of the year, she will be an Enrolled Agent also. She will be ready to take that test," she said.

Payne goes on to explain that she is technically not an accountant or Certified Public Accountant, but an Enrolled Agent (EA). To become an accountant, one requires four years of college education as an EA.

"I required a lot of tax law education, and I'm actually licensed by the IRS," said Payne. "With that I have an associate's degree in accounting

and I'm working on a master's in taxation.

She is required to have 32 hours of actual yearly education for an Enrolled Agent.

"As an enrolled agent, I am more than taxed," she said. "If you get a letter from the IRS that you disagree with, and we couldn't find a power of attorney, then I become you and I handle all of that for you."

She received her education from Harrison College, formerly Indiana Business College.

Before that Payne went to school in Knightstown, from kindergarten to her graduation from Knightstown High School in 1982.

Payne currently lives in Charlottesville. As a child, she lived north of Knightstown, at a Shirley address on Grant City Road.

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Drug Take-Back Program Saturday

Henry County will be participating in the National Prescription Drug Take-Back event on Saturday, Sept. 26.

This event addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that are left in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse and abuse.

Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. and Indiana are alarming high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including the home medicine cabinet. Disposing of unused medicines by flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash poses a potential safety and health hazard.

Staff will be on hand Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the sheriff's office, 127 N. 12th St. in New Castle to help residents get rid of unwanted medicines. This service is provided at no cost and materials are accepted without questions according to Henry County Sheriff Ric McCorkle.

This is a time for local residents to turn in unwanted, unneeded or expired prescription drugs for safe disposal. Drugs can be in a variety of forms: liquid, creams, liquids, pills and capsules. They should be kept in their proper containers. The staff will not accept sharp items such as needles.

In Henry County, these drugs may also be disposed of at any time. White boxes, which look like mailboxes, are in the lobbies of the sheriff's office and the New Castle police, according to Olene Veach, educational coordinator for the sheriff's department and ARIES. These locations allow anyone to bring in drugs at any time day or night. To place drugs in these containers, they need to be in a secure container and they will be disposed of in a safe manner according to regulations.

With one member absent, board members voted 6-0 at their Sept. 15 monthly meeting to approve the contract, which covers the current school year. Superintendent Jed Behny said at the meeting that negotiations with CAB's Classroom Teachers Association had been a "very open and collaborative."

"There weren't a ton of changes this year," Behny told the board.

The teacher pay schedule that was part of last year's contract did not change. Because of how that is set up, Behny said raises for teachers are not uniform, but vary depending on where the teachers education and years of experience place them on the schedule.

There were some changes made to the extracurricular positions available. Behny said some that had not been filled for some time were dropped, while others, including four positions heading new clubs at the elementary school, were added.

"I'm excited to have it done, to be real honest with you," Behny told The Banner on Monday. "It's always a difficult process because you want See Contract, Page 16

The information will be obtained from the Certified Reports of Names, Addresses, Duties and Compensation of Public Employees (Form 100R) required by law to be filed with the Indiana State Board of Accounts by Jan. 31 each year, which show the compensation of the governmental units' employees and officials for the preceding calendar

This week's installment takes a look at the Charles A. Beard Memorial School Corp., and the compensation paid to its employees and officials during 2014. The Form 100R report from which this information was taken is also available online at the website for the Indiana Gateway for Government Units, www.gateway.ifionline.org/report_builder.

*The Form 100R report that CAB filed with the Indiana State Board of Accounts for compensation paid to town employees and officials during calendar year 2014 did not identify the specific departments in which the employees and officials worked, as required by state statute. Instead, it simply listed the school corporation where it should have provided the school and/or specific department in which the employee or official worked. As noted in previous issues of The Banner, the SBA has taken the position that this information, which is required by state statute to be included in the Form 100R reports, should be included in future reports.

Banner Question Prompts Council to Change Course

Alcohol is still OK at the Sunset Park shelter house, at least for a few more weeks.

As previously reported in The Banner, the Knightstown Parks and Recreation Board voted in July to lift the ban on alcohol at the shelter house. In August, the Knightstown Town Council began taking steps to nullify the park board's decision by directing the town's attorney to draft an ordinance that would ban alcohol on all town-owned property.

Last week, at the council's Sept. 17 monthly meeting, attorney Gregg Morelock presented the council with Ordinance 5-2015. He read aloud the ordinance, which, once passed on two readings and published in The Banner, would make it illegal for anyone to bring any illegal drugs or "beer, ale, wine or any other alcoholic beverage of any type ... within or upon any streets, alleyways, rights of way, and real estate, including any improvements located thereon," that are owned by the town.

After Morelock finished reading the ordinance, council member Clyde South made a motion to approve it on first reading, and council member Mitch Roland seconded the motion. With support from President Cort Swincher, Vice President Sarah Ward and council member Valerie Trump, the vote was unanimous.

The council next suspended its normal rules of procedure to allow a second vote on the ordinance that night, with Morelock reading the ordinance by its title only. Before the council took its vote of adoption, however, The Banner asked whether the ordinance made it unlawful to transport lawfully-purchased alcohol in town.

Morelock said the ordinance would have no effect for those on U.S. 40 or S.R. 109. However, he said anyone with alcohol in their vehicle on a town-owned road would "potentially" be in violation of the ordinance.

"It would be the officer's discretion, I suppose," Morelock said.

The Banner asked whether the ordinance was intended to make Knightstown a "dry town."

"You're asking the wrong person," Morelock replied. "... I'm not making it a dry town, no. ... I don't think it's the effect of the ordinance. I think the effect of the ordinance is in how it's enforced."

South questioned whether the "cure we've got here is worse than the illness," and said, "Let's not put the liquor store out of business. ... I would caution the council to reconsider the language of the ordinance, because it hadn't occurred to me that a guy ... buying a six-pack of beer would be violating the ordinance when he comes back home."

Morelock said he thought the issue could be addressed by changing the ordinance so that it only applies to open containers of alcohol.

"I could support that," South said. He and Trump made a motion to amend the ordinance, and Morelock said he would make that change and bring a revised ordinance to the council's October monthly meeting.

While Morelock told council members the town owns Sunset Park and any buildings located there, including the shelter house, there is some question as to whether the council has the authority to undermine the park board's lifting of the alcohol ban. According to state statute, it is the park board that is in charge of establishing rules governing the use of the park and its recreational facilities.

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K-town Council Agrees to Hire Two Policemen

The Knightstown Town Council has approved hiring two new police officers to replace one who resigned earlier this month and another who is stepping down next week

Council members voted 5-0 at their Sept. 17 monthly meeting to approve hiring Daniel Montgomery as a full-time officer. He will replace Melissa Clark, who resigned after just a few months on the job.

Chief of Police Duane Booth told council members that five or six applications had been received for the full-time officer opening and that three were interviewed. Council Vice President Sarah Ward, who sits on the council's two-person police committee that helped Booth with interviews, said Montgomery "shows maturity" and, living locally, could "add stability" to the department.

The council also voted at last week's meeting to hire Seth Myers as a part-time officer. He will take the place of Captain Anthony Darling, whose resignation will take effect at the end of the month.

Booth said Darling was stepping down because he is taking a position with his church that will take more of his time. As for Clark, Booth said he thought she was seeking other employment opportunities.

Montgomery, 25, who was already a volunteer reserve officer with the Knightstown Police Department, has not yet been through the 16-week officer training course at the Indiana Law

Enforcement Academy. Myers, Booth said, is already ILEA

The ILEA training carries no tuition cost for the town or Montgomery. However, while he is attending the ILEA training program, the town will be required to pay Montgomery his full-time wages, in addition to paying someone to cover his shifts while he's at the academy.

As a term of his employment, the town will be asking Montgomery to sign a contract obligating him to work for the town for at least two years after finishing his ILEA training. Should he leave before the two years is up, he would be required to reimburse the town for what it paid him while he was in training.

South commented that the KPD is one of the lowest paying police departments in Henry County. He said that until that issue is resolved, the town will continue to lose its police officers to departments that are able to pay more.

Ward said that Montgomery and the other two applicants all told them that the starting pay at the KPD was within a few cents of what they were making at their current jobs

South asked how many of the KPD's three full-time officers had been working for the department even just one year ago.

"None," answered Council President Cort Swincher.

"I don't agree a lot with Clyde," local businessman and Wayne Township resident Jeff Van Hoy told the council, "but I agree with him on this one."

Critical Comment Sparks Heated Exchange at Meeting

A critical comment from a member of the public got under the skin of town of Knightstown employee at last week's Knightstown Town Council meeting and led to a shouting match behind town hall.

The employee involved was Greg Neice, the town's works manager. As he was wrapping up his monthly report to the council at its Sept. 17 monthly meeting, Council Vice President Sarah Ward asked Neice about why she had not seen him during a recent three-and-a-half hour water leak repair that town employees had made near her home.

"We never saw you the whole time," Ward said to Neice.

"He shouldn't have to be there," council member Valerie Trump interiected.

"Well, if he's supervising the workers and it's three-and-a-half hours, don't you think he'd show up a minute?"

"I've been working down at the wastewater plant, Ms. Ward," Neice said. "Sorry."

At that point, local businessman and Wayne Township resident Jeff Van Hoy, who was sitting in the front row, just behind where Neice was standing to give his report, remarked, loud enough for Neice to hear, that he didn't believe the works manager.

"Whatever, Jeff," Neice said, turning to Van Hoy. "You want to do this?"

"I think I probably could," Van Hoy answered.

"You better eat your Wheaties, buddy," said Neice.

After finishing his report, Neice returned to his seat in the back of the room. As soon as the meeting adjourned, Van Hoy went walked back there and confronted Neice. The two men faced off and had some words and agreed to take the matter outside, exiting the room down a dark hallway that led to the parking lot behind town hall.

Before leaving the room, Van Hoy tapped Chief of Police Duane Booth

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

to make sure that it's fair and equitable, and in this day and age, with the teacher shortage, you have to find ways to entice and retain the talent that you have

"It's not simply about pay. It's about treating people as professionals, and that's what I think we've done with this contract."

In other personnel matters, the board received and accepted three resignation notices at last week's board meeting. Julie Russell, behavior consultant at Knightstown Elementary and Knightstown Intermediate School, resigned effective Aug. 26 to take a full-time social worker position with another school district that would be paying her about 50-percent more than she was making at CAB.

In her letter of resignation, Russell said she thought CAB could use a full- or part-time social worker devoted to KES. She said the elementary school students would benefit from having someone there more than just two half days per week.

CAB also received resignations from two bus drivers, Todd Cleek and Diana Wright. The school board approved keeping Cleek on its roster of substitute bus drivers

The board also approved Devin Hamilton, Michael Wanhainen, Larry White, Darryl Keesling and Pat Adams as volunteers for the KHS FFA program.

as he walked past him in an effort to get him to follow them outside. Booth, however, remained seated.

"I did that because I thought it was going to get pretty heated, but Duane never even budged," Van Hoy told The Banner on Monday. "... He never came outside."

Booth told The Banner that he did eventually walk to the back of town hall and look out the window. However, he said council member Clyde South had gone outside and was attempting to calm things down, and that he didn't feel his intervention was needed.

"Nobody came and got me to break anything up or take anyone to jail,"
Booth said

"We were probably out there 45 minutes," Van Hoy told The Banner. "(Neice) got to yelling. I told him I didn't come out there to yell. I came out to voice my opinion on some things."

Van Hoy said he doesn't think Neice does his job properly. He also said he believes Neice makes too many unnecessary trips back and forth to Greenfield when he should be in town working.

"He said, 'I'm on business. I'm going to Home Depot to get supplies for the town of Knightstown.' I said, 'All the time? Two or three times a day?"

Van Hoy said Neice, who drives a town-owned car, also commented that he goes home for lunch most days. He said Neice told him that he pays for gas for the town car he drives.

Van Hoy, who also serves on the Wayne Township Board as well as the Knightstown-Wayne Township Fire Board, said he didn't think Neice acted very professionally during their encounter.

The Banner attempted to contact Neice for comment on this matter. He did not, however, return a call to the newspaper before the news deadline for this week's issue.

around-the-clock presence of a registered nurse, something he said would have made the project cost-prohibitive.

A few apartments could be ready in as soon as 90 days, but King said it could take a year or more before the whole project is complete. He said there could easily be 10 apartments - maybe 11 if the former school's office space is also utilized.

The only bid received for the Carthage property was one for \$14,000 from Carthage Community Church. The school board also voted 6-0 at last week's meeting to accept that bid.

Dennis Muncy, who addressed the board on behalf of CCC, said the church doesn't have enough room at its current location in a former bank building on South Main Street.

"The Carthage community is headed south," Muncy said. "... There's no business to amount to anything. We just feel like if we could get this building, we could make some awful good use of it."

In addition to the church, Muncy said the former school would also house CCC's food pantry. He said they would also like to have a preschool at the location.

"There's really no end to the things we could do there for the community and, of course, to further God's word," Muncy said. "We're all about following God's word."

"I was hoping the Carthage bid would be better than \$14,000, but it could have been that we would have had to sell it for \$1," board member Gerald Leonard said. "... But, I am so glad that it is staying in the Carthage community and the Kennard school is staying in the Kennard community. ... I feel good about what we're doing here tonight, personally."

Speaking to The Banner on Monday, Superintendent Jed Behny also expressed some disappointment in the sale prices on the two properties, saying it's a "tough pill to swallow." However, he said he was hopeful that things would work out well for the buyers and the Kennard and Carthage communities

"The hope has been since that day that we would be able to find a purpose for these buildings that could be beneficial to the communities in which they sit. I hope that both of the entities that were successful bidders are able to get their hopes and dreams to come to fruition for these buildings because I do think they will both beneficial to the communities that they serve."

Behny told The Banner that school board members had been under no obligation to accept any of the bids that were received. He said the board could have made counteroffers, or simply tabled the issue and allowed more time to see if there were any other interested buyers.

One thing Behny said the board had to keep in mind is that it was costing CAB about \$2,000 a month for utilities, maintenance expenses and insurance on the two properties. With respect to insurance costs, he also noted that the deductible on the former schools was due to double, from \$5,000 to \$10,000, in January.

While she did not name him at last week's council meeting, Grigsby had previously told The Banner that Bruce Brown, the park board's vice president, was the person who had been verbally abusive to her. Speaking to The Banner on Monday, Brown acknowledged that he and Grigsby had some differences of opinion, but denied her claim of verbal abuse.

Brown confirmed that the park board is still scheduled to hold its September monthly meeting at 7 p.m. this evening in the back meeting room at Knightstown Town Hall, 26 S. Washington St., which is accessible from the building's west side. The meeting is open to the public.


